Teaching Ocean Tech

Eighty percent of the world's oceans are unexplored. The desire to unlock the secrets of our world's oceans in the last century and the advances in technology has put a greater focus on ocean technology education and research. Programs at the Dauphin Island Sea Lab follow the need and are increasing each year to meet the demand of STEM learning. With this in mind, the DISL Foundation is launching a campaign in December 2020 to meet this need with a larger and deeper pool, along with an adjacent outdoor classroom.

In the last decade, Discovery Hall Programs added field classes, summer camps, and professional development workshops on remotely operated vehicles (ROVs). DHP marine educators show students and teachers how to build these robots and use them in current applications. They learn how to wire, enhance capabilities with 3D printed tools, and 'fly' the robots underwater. Each ROV program ends with a mini-competition, similar to the Northern Regional MATE ROV Competition hosted by DHP for the past eight years. Currently, the mission test is held off-campus; however, the new outdoor classroom and deeper pool will allow DHP to host the entire competition on DISL campus from start to finish.





Ocean exploration also relies on scientific divers to collect data for scientific or educational purposes. In 1992, DISL joined the American Academy of Underwater Science (AAUS) to offer University Program (UP) students and faculty training and certification in scientific diving. Enhancing the depth of the pool will allow UP to upgrade this program to better reflect the needs of this specialized underwater dive training.

An additional benefit of this outdoor classroom and pool, will be for UP to test and calibrate equipment and deliver the vessel training course which teaches critical water rescue techniques and safe operations for small boat users.

Overall, the larger, deeper pool and outdoor classroom will expand opportunities for teaching, allow for more students participating simultaneously, a larger area for recreation, and provide a teaching location adaptable to times of pandemics.

Supporting Adventures



Students sink deep into the world of marine science during Discovery Hall Programs' four-week residential high school course. Some students use the course to adjust their college and career path. Others just have an interest in the marine world. Whatever the reason, the experience leaves a lasting impression. For some students, donation and grant-supported scholarships make the experience possible. This summer the DISLF funded three scholarships for the program.

"The scholarship has given me the opportunity to see if I wanted to pursue a career in marine science," Diamond Contee of Maryland shared. "I want to thank those that funded the scholarship because I know now I want to do this for the rest of my life."

Contee benefited from the newly established Mike deGruy Scholarship funded by the Dauphin Island Sea Lab

Foundation and the Mobile Bay National Estuary Program.

As the class is also open to recent high school graduates, Diamond will begin working towards a career in marine science at Coastal Carolina University this fall. She's interested in working with marine mammals after college.

The Marine Science High School Course isn't just about learning marine science, it's more about doing it. Students spend a lot of time in the field seeing organisms firsthand and learning how to use common equipment.

Longtime DHP Marine Educator Jenny Cook believed in the need to expand students' appreciation and awareness of our ocean planet and

enjoyed watching the students grow during the high school course. After she passed away, a scholarship fund was established in her honor. Wyatt Stanley, a homeschool student, and Emma Graves, a Thompson High School senior, were recipients of the Jenny Cook Memorial Scholarships this year, funded partially by Austal USA.

"The scholarship means the world to me," Wyatt said. "I want to be a marine veterinarian so being a part of this course allowed me to get up close and personal learning about all of the animals."



Graves isn't a stranger to DISL. This is her fourth year participating in summer programs at DHP, and was one of the most fulfilling experiences.

"It just means so much to me when I got the scholarship. It made me think about how my future will be impacted by this community of people," Graves said. "They believe in me and believe that I can do what I want to do in the marine science field."

For some like Graves, the path ahead includes a desire to return to the Dauphin Island Sea Lab as a University Programs student.

Stan Beasley

From my first summer at the Dauphin Island Sea Lab in 1986 through graduate school in the 1990s, DISL has profoundly impacted me. My experiences at DISL have taken me within the walls of the high schools and colleges to serve as a science instructor. I went from knowing very little about the marine environment to traveling halfway around the world as a researcher, taking part in science trips on the beloved RV A.E. Verrill, scouring the waters as a Sea Turtle Observer, exploring and discovering a new species from deep sea submersible dives, and forging friendships with scientists at the Smithsonian Institution. All of these opportunities I have taken part in over course of my life which are attributed to my educational experiences at DISL. These past 25 years, DISL's excellence in marine science education and hands-on approach have offered annually unique opportunities and adventures for my students from Alabama, Virginia, and Tennessee, including my two sons.

I currently work at the Kansas City Zoo, bringing animals and conservation activities to schools. I also lead the zoo's homeschool program for their oldest age group. My Master's at DISL helped me appreciate the need for translating marine science (and other fields of science) to broad and narrow parts of the general public. Every time I put together a presentation or video, I use Dr. Dorgan's lessons on how to make your work easy to understand and engaging. I get praise for being a good science educator, and that comes from having good professors and fellow students critiquing my work and freely offering advice.

Overcoming Microscopic Challenges



Teaching virtually presented new challenges for University Programs summer faculty this year. Field trips, labs, and classes all went online for the more than two dozen courses offered this summer.

With the support of Regions Bank, students in several classes still had a close up look at the microscopic world of marine science. The donation allowed for the purchase of four high-powered microscopes, two Accuscope compounds and two Unitron 2850 dissectors. One of each included cameras. These cameras made virtual viewing and virtual teaching more dynamic.

"They were absolutely invaluable. I could not have taught my Marine Invertebrate Zoology class effectively without them," Dr. Ruth Carmichael, DISL Senior Marine Scientist and University of South Alabama Department of Marine Sciences Professor, shared. "They were essential to show just about everything."

This course is taught each summer and explores the morphology, natural history, and evolutionary relationships of these animals, which include cnidarians, sponges, marine worms, lophophorates, mollusks,

arthropods, echinoderms, and the hemichordates. With the challenge of teaching remotely, the microscopes allowed Carmichael to show live specimens and dissections, take measurements, and capture photos all while the class was watching.

"Clearly, it is not the same as students physically being able to collect their own samples and stare down the microscope to learn algae, but access to these microscopes made it possible to get as close as we could, given limitations of remote learning," Dr. Jeremiah Henning said.



Henning, a University of South Alabama Biology Department Assistant Professor, taught Marine Botany during the first session of summer courses. His experience echoes that of Carmichael's.

"In the age of remote teaching, having access to high quality microscopes was critical to the success of my course," Henning explained. "It was amazing being able to generate high resolution figures of leaf surfaces or diatom communities that students could then process and perform analyses to understand the response of stomata size across a salinity gradient or changes in algal communities in response to nutrient addition and light limitation."



"Teaching online provided a host of challenges, but the microscopes and cameras were certainly instrumental in making the summer program a success despite all the challenges," University Programs Chair Dr. Lee Smee expressed in his appreciation of the donation.

University Programs 2020 summer of virtual courses served students from 17 of 23 MESC Schools with 1,386 credit hours.
